The GOP attack on workers "Exit polls following the 2016 election show that 43 percent of those in union households voted for Mr. Trump. RECIPE EXCHANGE

Last month I attended a cooking demonstration at the Luther Home in Arlington Hts. The demonstration was on 5 ways to use rotisserie chicken. You probably saw them in the grocery store and thought there is too much chicken for 1 or 2 people. Well, we tasted the following two ways to use the leftover chicken after using it as roasted chicken.

WHITE CHICKEN CHILI FOR 2

1/2 cup diced onion 5-6 oz cooked and shredded chicken 1 15oz can cannellini beans undrained

1 cup chicken broth1 4oz can green chilies drained

1 tsp. garlic salt

3/4 tsp oregano

1/2 tsp cumin

1/4 tsp chili powder

1/4 tsp ground red pepper

TOPPINGS- sour cream, shredded cheese, chopped tomatoes, diced avocado.

Heat a large pot, sprayed well with nonstick cooking spray, to medium-high heat; add onions and cook until lightly browned. Remove pot from heat and add chicken, beans, broth chilies, garlic salt, cumin, oregano, chili powder and red pepper; mix well. Return to the burner and heat to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve hot with optional toppings.

CRANBERRY-WALNUT CHICKEN SALAD

1 cup shredded chicken 1/4 cup chopped walnuts 1 celery stalk, diced 1/4 cup dried cranberries 1/2 cup mayo 1/2 tsp granulated garlic A shake of salt and a shake of pepper, combine all ingredients and serve as a salad or a sandwich or on crackers.


