## Required Minimum Distribution

- Some examples...
  - At age 70 your life expectancy is 27.4 years (according to the IRS) so you must take approximately 3.65% of the balance
  - At age 80 your life expectancy is 18.7 years, so you must take approximately
     5.35% of the balance
  - o At age 90 your life expectancy is 11.4 years so you must take approximately 8.77% of the balance
  - At age 100 your life expectancy is 6.3 years so you must take approximately 15.87% of the balance.

The good news is that your 401(k) provider or IRA custodian -- if you roll-over-can in some cases calculate the RMD for you.

#### RECIPE EXCHANGE

Apricot-Glazed Pork Tenderloin for two 1-3/4 lb pork tenderloin 2 tsps olive oil 1/8 tsp salt dash pepper 1/3 cup apricot preserves I this sherry or reduced sodium chicken broth 1 tsp Dijon mustard I clove garlic, minced 1/2 teaspoon minced fresh thyme or 1/8 tsp dried thyme Place pork in a shallow pan. Combine the oil. salt and pepper; rub over pork. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. In a small bowl, combine the remaining ingredients; spoon over park. Bake 10 to 17 minutes longer or until a thermometer reads 145 degrees, basting occasionally with pan juices. Let stand for 5 minutes before slicing.
