From The Podium

Like most young people I really didn't know what I wanted to do for my life time career. My parents wanted me to attend college. What should I study? I decided to be an accountant but the thought of sitting in the same office crunching numbers all day with the same people day after day; year after year did nothing for me. It was during this same time period someone shared the thought with me that: "a job is not a job if you love what you do". Growing up I never heard my grandfather or father say anything negative about being an electrician, in fact

they appeared quite happy and successful. It was settled. After 2 years I dropped out of school and signed up for the apprenticeship.

I was introduced to the trade in the summer of 1967 as a summer helper with my grandfather. I will be honest, I didn't like getting dirty and did not like the repetitive non-important jobs like unloading bundles of conduit, sorting material and keeping the shop organized. But I loved the ever changing job locations and social interactions with the then old-timers. "Coffee break" was the best. Interacting with the different personalities was interesting. I realized people had different attitudes about money. Some would take their change, other would say "keep the change." As an apprentice with a wife and a little one I always appreciated when someone would say "let me buy yours kid." I loved getting coffee for the gang. I remember the smell of the coffee and hot food at the back of the roach wagon and digging in the ice to find a chocolate milk to go with my glazed donut. Most guys would have a coffee and a hard roll with butter. How did the vendor add the cost so fast

and issue change? Then the 15 to 20+ minute break, time to exchange stories and ideas, laugh or complain about something. Guys shared lifetime experiences or humorous tales. I would later nick name this "smoke and joke time" I would learn to appreciate this time in the field to respect these men and hold many of them as my mentors, for both good and bad. They taught me both about the trade and some lessons of life.

As an apprentice I craved to learn how everything went together. My father said I was always asking questions. I can still remember wiring my first control circuit incorporating a starter with a remote stop/start station to start a motor, it was like magic. I was hooked.

My career was very diverse. I either worked in a small crew or large crew or sometimes alone. I worked to build a nursing home, UPS distribution center, hi-rise condos, hi-rise office buildings, steel manufacturing plant, coke battery, deep tunnel project, nuclear power plant, newspaper printing facility, trade shows, industrial maintenance, universities, and the list goes on. I finished my career at the Northlake data center where I watch multiple contractors and hundreds of us electricians build a massive power structure to support the electrical needs for the "cloud." Five months from start to finish. Local 134 can truly be proud of our members! What an impressive job.

What's my point? Laced between the work was the comradery with my fellow brothers. Lots of them. The friendships developed and personal experiences shared helped create that love of what I did. Yes, I loved what I did and therefore seldom considered it a job!





Why were "right to work" laws originally adopted?

The Depression years of the 1930s saw a dramatic upsurge in union organizing, formalized by the passage of the National Labor Relations Act in 1935. Threatened by workers' mobilizations, an oil industry lobbyist named Vance Muse promoted the term "right to work" in 1936 to describe restrictions on union activity. An associate of the Ku Klux Klan, Muse saw unionization not only as a threat to employers' high rate of profitability but also to the white supremacist order of the Jim Crow South. As labor organizers sought to bring working people together across racial lines, Muse warned that without "right to work" legislation to impede union organizing, "white women and white men will be forced into organizations with black African apes whom they will have to call 'brother' or lose their jobs." Preying on the ugliest racial enmity, Muse's organization advanced "right to work" aggressively in the segregated South, with Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia among the first states to adopt the anti-worker laws.




